The Port of Los Angeles (the Port) would like to establish itself under the Alternative Site Framework (ASF) with its Service Area designated as the following counties: portions of Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties and all of Orange County as described below.

The Port's Zone contains Sites within these counties and each county meets the adjacency requirements of the Zone regulations. The Port has secured an Agreement with the counties of Los Angeles, San Bernardino and Orange to include them within the Service Area of the Port of Los Angeles' Zone as highlighted in the Service Area map and letters attached within this section. The Service Area also complies with the State Enabling Legislation as well as the Grantee's Charter. The Service Area boundaries are a follows:

Starting at the southwest corner of Orange County proceeding North along the Pacific Ocean up to the western border of Los Angeles County, then following the western border of Los Angeles County North until you reach the Ventura County border, follow the Ventura County border East to Highway 118, follow Highway 118 East along the City of Los Angeles City limit boundary to the Northeast until it meets with the Western edge of the Angeles National Forest (ANF), follow the border of the ANF to the East until it intersects with the Los Angeles and San Bernardino County line, follow the line South to Interstate 210, follow Interstate 210 East until it intersects Highway 30, then follow Highway 30 to the East and continue to follow Highway 30 until it intersects with Highway 330, follow Highway 330 North until it intersects with the San Bernardino National Forest (SBNF) border line, follow the SBNF border East-Southeast until it intersects with the San Bernardino County line at the southeast corner of San Bernardino County, then following the San Bernardino County line West until it meets the Orange County line.
